B. Miss. Degree Programme

1. Nature of the B. Miss. Degree

The Bachelor of Missiology (B.Miss.) degree programme is one of the theological programmes offered by the Senate of Serampore College (University). The B.Miss Degree course is designed to equip persons for essential functions and ministries of the Church as he/she engages in mission of Jesus Christ in the Indian/Asian context. It is an integrative study programme, making use of Biblical, Theological, Pastoral, Missiological, Religious, Cultural, Social, Linguistic and Communication Approaches, for preparing workers for the mission of God. The course seeks to facilitate personal, spiritual, academic, and missional formation of students.

The programme is intended to instill and cultivate good moral values and life-style in the lives of the students. Character building is also an essential part of theological education. The degree programme attempts to inculcate a sense of commitment and integrity in the students. The B.Miss degree programme is a missionary training programme for social and spiritual transformation of individual and society.

2. Objectives

- 1. To develop a mature understanding of the Bible and Christian Faith;
- 2. To impart a wholistic understanding of the concept and practice of Mission;
- 3. To discern God's Mission in the contemporary context and to responsibly commit one's life to work for the same.
- 4. To equip students for effective leadership in God's mission by exposing to different missionary situations.

3. Admission Requirements for the BMiss. Degree

I. A candidate at the time of admission to the B.Miss. degree course must satisfy one of the following conditions.

S/he should:

- a. have completed 18 years of age.
- b. have passed 10+2 (Higher Secondary/PU) Course with eligibility to enter a degree course of a recognized university.

Or

- c. have passed Class X and should have done two years of further study in a theological or secular institution and should have experience in Christian ministry or any public service.
- d. be a mature person who is at least 25 years of age and passed the "Mature Candidate Entrance Examination" of the Senate.

S/he should have passed HSLC, and is prevented by some special reason from pursuing his/ her secular studies, and able to produce evidence to that effect. S/he should have been in full time vocation/ profession/ employment for two years.

(The Mature Candidate Entrance Examination will be conducted by the Senate. The candidates may write to the Registrar for details).

- e. have completed DipCS with English qualifying papers;
- f. have completed Dip BT with qualifying English paper

Affiliated colleges, however, may insist on additional requirements in terms of length of study, courses, practical training etc., within the stipulated limits.

II. Entrance Test

Colleges are expected to conduct an Entrance Test, for the admission of candidates, in the areas of Language (Regional/ English), Scripture Knowledge and General Knowledge.

III.Interview

Candidates will be expected to face a Personal Interview with the College concerned.

IV. Remedial English

Colleges should conduct courses in Remedial English for those who are weak in it.

No student shall be admitted to any course offered by the Senate of Serampore College (University) if he/she does not fulfill required stipulations of the Senate and does not have required qualification as per Senate norms.

Senate shall not be liable for any legal action if student is not registered due to his failure in qualifying clauses for the course.

4. Point of Entry

A candidate at the time of admission should have completed 18 years of age having passed the Entrance Test conducted by the College.

5. Registration for the Course

i. Application for registration must be made in the appropriate form obtainable from the Registrar and sent to the Registrar together with the registration fee as applicable. This must reach the Registrar as notified from time to time.

An applicant must provide:

- a. attested copies of academic certificates or certified copies of academic transcripts
- b. migration certificate from the university last attended/School leaving certificate
- c. certificate of birth or other acceptable evidence of date of birth
- d. a satisfactory certificate of character from his/her appropriate church authorities
- e. any additional information and references that may be considered desirable in support of his/her application.
- f. The registration fee must be sent by Demand Draft drawn in favor of "Senate of Serampore College" to reach the Registrar on or before the prescribed date.
- ii. Application for registration which reaches the Registrar later than the due date may be received at the discretion of the Registrar, provided it reaches not later than 30th September of the same year on payment of a late registration fee as indicated.
- iii. Registration of students pursuing concurrent academic programmes in other university/institutions shall be cancelled.

6. Internal Studies

The B.Miss degree course is available for internal (residential) study only through the institutions/colleges affiliated to the Senate of Serampore College (University).

7. Medium of Instruction

The medium of study and examination for the degree course is English or any regional language as approved by the Senate.

Regional languages, as recognized, are as follows: Hindi, Bengali, Odiya, Telgu, Tamil, Malayalam, Kannada, Marathi, Gujarati, Santhali, Mizo and Ao.

8. Duration of Study

The length of the B.Miss. Degree Course is three years. The maximum time allowed to complete all the requirements would be five years from the date of registration.

9. Courses

- a. The programme shall consist of a total of 21 courses including Dissertation or project work.
- b. Where there are half courses (2 credit courses), they shall be counted along with other similar courses to constitute one full paper having a total of 50 class hours.
- c. Those who write Dissertation/ project shall be exempted from Two/one courses.

- d. Those who will opt for classical language shall be exempted from one four credit course.
- e. The courses recommended for study may be seen in Part III: Curriculum

Each course could be taught and studied through class lectures, library reading, seminars and consultations. Practical work/exposure shall be part of the teaching and training programme. Candidates will be expected to write an examination at the end of each semester. Fieldwork/Exposure/Education programme shall be given credit.

11. Study Schedule

- i. Senate stipulates that each course should be of 50 hour duration;
- ii. One clock hour is considered to be the duration of class; enough time should be provided for discussion and interaction.

12. Dissertation/Project

A candidate may be permitted to write a Dissertation/project for the completion of the required courses. S/he should submit the Dissertation/ project proposal on a prescribed form to the college faculty for approval before the end of the academic year in the second year. The following conditions are to be observed regarding submission of a Dissertation/ project:

- i. Only those students, securing an average of B in the first three semesters shall be allowed to write dissertation/Project.
- ii. The Dissertation/ project should be written in English/Regional Language, as approved by the Senate.
- iii. The candidate should submit to the Senate his/her Dissertation/project proposal along with the name of the advisor by 15th April, through the Principal of the college for approval. The candidate will be expected to identify the resources and submit them along with the title.
- iv. The Dissertation/project must be typewritten on paper of uniform size (preferably 8.5" x 11") and bound in hard covers.
- v. Three copies of the Dissertation/project must be submitted to the college as prescribed before the end of his/her final Course Examination/ the academic session
- vi. The Dissertation/project must be written in accordance with the guidelines given and published by the Senate.

- vii. The length of the Dissertation shall be not less than 8,000 words and not more than 10,000 words. The length of the project will be determined by the faculty of the college.
- viii. The Dissertation/project submitted for examination will remain the property of the Senate/College.
- ix. A candidate may be permitted to write 2 papers (8 credit courses) in lieu of Dissertation; and 4 credit courses in lieu of a project.
- x. The Dissertation/project will be evaluated for 200/100 marks.
- xi. The Dissertation/project may commence from the second semester of the second year and should be over by the end of the second semester of the final year. Students should be exempted from 8/4 credit courses in the final year for Dissertation/ project related studies.
- xi. The candidate is expected to follow the research manuals prescribed below:

13. Plagiarism (copying, illegal use of others work, breach of copyright etc.)

Independent research and writing play a vital part in the course requirements, examinations, Dissertation and project. Students, therefore, should be aware of the strong sanctions against plagiarism. If proven, a charge of plagiarism could result in an automatic F in the course and possible expulsion/cancellation of registration. If anyone has any questions or doubts about what plagiarism entails or how to properly acknowledge source materials and the works of others, be sure to consult the faculty concerned.

14. Academic System

The academic year for the BMiss degree course is from June to April.

All affiliated colleges will uniformly follow semester system during the academic year. This will help colleges arrange student-staff exchange programmes and accept credits for the courses completed.

15. Examination and Evaluation

Examination and evaluation are conducted by the Senate/Colleges as per procedures and rules laid down by the Senate.

- i. The Annual Examinations for the BMiss course, under the Senate, are normally held during March-April each year. College Examination shall, however, be conducted at the end of each semester.
- ii. Each paper, unless otherwise stated, is of three hours' duration and covers the subject matter indicated in the syllabus.
- iii. After registration, application for admission to the examination must be made on the appropriate form obtainable from the Registrar and should reach the same on or before the time prescribed by the Senate. The examination fee, as indicated below, should also be sent to the Registrar, Senate of Serampore College on or before the prescribed date.
- iv. All the Senate/College examinations for the BMiss degree shall normally be evaluated by two examiners. The Senate will not entertain requests for re-evaluation of any script and/or permit re-examination for improvement of grade.
- v. A candidate should give an undertaking at the time of registration that s/he will abide by all the rules and regulations of the Senate of Serampore College as applicable to the Bachelor of Missiology degree including the decisions of the Senate and its Academic Council.
- vi. A candidate for the B.Miss degree will normally appear for the course examination each year according to the sequence given.

- vii. Candidate will not receive credit unless s/he appears and passes in at least 50% of the courses at each sitting.
- viii. A candidate may appear for any referred paper in addition to the papers studied provided he/she does not appear for courses equivalent to 9 full courses (36 credits) in any year. This rule may not apply to those who have less than five course papers to complete the degree programme.
- ix. Colleges will follow the norms and procedures of the Senate in conducting and evaluating scripts for the college examinations.
- x. Practical Work/Field Education will also be credited.

16. Total number of papers and their class-wise and proportional divisions

Candidates will be allowed to register for not more than 12 courses per academic year.

Each course will have a credit of 50 class hours. Papers can, however, be divided into half and full courses, i.e. 30 or 50 hours. If a module system is used, the credits for each should be clearly spelt out.

Dissertation/project writing is not compulsory. However, the Faculty may grant permission to certain candidates, who maintain B grade in the first three semesters, to write a Dissertation/project. Such persons shall be exempted from a stipulated number of courses in lieu of Dissertation/project.

17. Centre for Examinations

Normally the Serampore College and its affiliated Colleges are centres for examinations. A candidate applying for permission to take his/her examination at another affiliated College, must obtain prior consent of the Principal and submit it along with his/her Examination Entry Form to the Registrar. He/she shall pay the prescribed fee as per rule.

18. Late application for Senate Examinations

An application made under Section 15 which reaches the Registrar later than the specified date may be received at the Registrar's discretion, provided the application is received not later than the time prescribed. Such application, if accepted, is subject to the payment of a late examination entry fee as prescribed.

19. Withdrawal or Absence from Examination

A candidate who withdraws from the Senate/College examination or who fails to take the examination, for which he/she has been registered, forfeits the examination fee paid. Under no circumstances will the examination fee be refunded.

20. Extension of Time

Extension of time for the completion of the degree may be granted by the Academic Council of the Senate in very exceptional circumstances only, such as illness at the time of the examination. Application for such extension will only be considered if it is received within one month after the examination is over together with a certificate from a qualified medical officer.

21. Re-registration

If the period of registration of a candidate has expired, he/she can avail the opportunity for reregistration as per rules.

Following rules shall be applied:

- i. As a policy, not more than 50% of the courses completed should be given credit.
- ii. Only students, who have completed at least 50% of the residential study, if applicable, shall be given credit for the courses completed.

- iii. Only those who have completed second and third years of study shall be granted credits up to 50% of the courses completed.
- iv. Credits shall first be given only to those courses in which the student has received a minimum of B-
- v. Those who have completed the residential requirements, wherever applicable, shall be exempted from further residential requirements. However, the Colleges shall arrange two short courses of three weeks each, twice a year for these students, on the advice of the Faculty, as per the need of each case.

22. Pass and failure in examinations

A candidate who fails in any paper or papers is regarded as being "referred" in such paper or papers, and is permitted to offer himself/herself for re-examination in that paper or those papers, or in any other paper or papers that may be substituted in accordance with the Regulations, provided that he/she is able to complete the requirements of the Degree within the time allowed. Any change in the papers already taken but referred must be applied before July 15th each year.

If a student is referred in 50% of the courses offered in a year, s/he shall be referred in all the papers and shall not be promoted to higher class.

23. Standard of pass and class (same as universities)

The pass mark for each paper in the examination of B.D degree course is 40%.

24. Results, Marks and Transcript of Record

- a. Notification of the results of the Senate examinations with grades obtained will be sent to the affiliated colleges/candidates by the Registrar.
- b. A Transcript of Record giving a candidate's complete record of courses and marks may be obtained on application to the Registrar on payment of a required fee.

25. Prizes

The Senate awards prizes to students who obtain distinctions in Senate examinations. There are a few prizes which are instituted by institutions/individuals/families. Prizes and Awards are given in almost every branch of studies and are given at the annual Convocation of Serampore College (University).

28. Relationship of B.Miss degree course to BD/BCS

Any student who qualifies for the BMiss degree can pursue the BD or BCS degree course.

29. Convocation of Serampore College (University)

The Convocation of the Senate of Serampore College (University) is conducted by the Council of Serampore College, and held annually, generally in the first week of February. Every student who has qualified for the degree is expected to attend the Convocation to receive his/her degree in person from the Master of Serampore College.

Candidates who have been granted the degree *in absentia* should apply to the Registrar for the degree through their affiliated colleges sending the *in absentia* fee by Demand Draft in favor of the Senate of Serampore College.

30. Date of Validity of Regulations

Regulations relating to the Bachelor of Missiology (B.Miss.) and examinations, as detailed above, is effective from 2013 academic year.

3. Field Education

Field education (practical work) shall be an integral part of ministerial training; it will require at least six months of field work during the entire periods of study. Faculty and students will be actively involved in the field work. Two kinds of field education are envisaged: concurrent and intensive. As far as the concurrent field education is concerned, besides the regular weekly practical ministry programme, candidates may be required to have meaningful practical exposure and reflection in relation to some of the subjects they study during the academic year. The Boards of Study/College Faculty shall recommend appropriate field education and exposure programmes in their respective disciplines. The intensive field education shall be meaningfully worked out by different colleges.

Field education shall be given credit, not merely in terms of number of hours, but in terms of the different kinds of practical work done: rural, urban, church-related, inter-faith, social action/reform movements, etc. As far as intensive field education is concerned, it should be of the length of 20 days for each year. Such intensive practical work could be conducted between the semester break, or during the winter (Christmas) vacation, or during the summer vacation (after the annual examination).

Out of the 20 days set aside for intensive field work, about 25% to 33% of the days would be given to orientation (introductory theoretical inputs, such as , research on the mission fields to understand the context of mission, etc.), and concluding reflection segments.

As far evaluation of the entire field education work for the year is concerned, 25% of the marks should be set aside concurrent practical work and 75% for intensive practical work. Out of 75% for the intensive practical work, 25% should be given for the reflective report written by the student and 50% for the actual practical work done. The mode of evaluation of the field education would be decided by each college.

The kind of intensive field education that can be suggested is as follows:

First Year	To be decided by each college.
Second year	Rural field education
Third year	Urban field education

It is suggested that the Dean of field education and faculty member-in-charge of each team spend a reasonable time with the students in their field placements.

The manner of reporting on the intensive field education programme (whether it would be an interdisciplinary colloquium, or group reporting, or individual reflective and critical reports etc.) is left to the discretion of the college.
